Clay modelling Workshop

Nine members assembled at Cherington Village Hall for a morning of clay modelling.

Our tutor was Charlie of Little Earthquake Pots. Charlie is from Nailsworth where she has a studio workshop in a log cabin.

Charlie had laid out a lot of equipment in readiness for us. It had been decided beforehand that we would all make a fruit bowl.

We started by rolling out our clay to the correct size and shape before decorating, using a choice of wooden printing blocks or leaves and seeds from the hedgerow; this would become the inside of the bowl. It was surprising to see how different they all were. We then carefully placed the clay over a bowl shaped mould before further smoothing and decorating.

We will not see the finished fruit bowls for several weeks as Charlie has taken them back to her studio for glazing and firing.

Charlie was an excellent tutor, giving assistance when needed, ensuring we all had a very enjoyable morning.
